The first included access to the upper tiers of seats via stairs on the rear wall, as at Pompeii, and had a small shrine next to its north entrance.

In use through much of the Roman occupation of Britain, the amphitheatre fell into disuse around the year 350. The amphitheatre was only rediscovered in 1929, when one of the pit walls was discovered during construction work. Between 2000 and 2006, excavation of the amphitheatre took place for Chester City Council and, after 2004, English Heritage.

The remains of at least 230 Roman amphitheatres have been found widely scattered around the area of the Roman Empire. These are large, circular or oval open-air venues with raised 360 degree seating and not to be confused with the more common theatres, which are semicircular structures. There are, however, a number of buildings that have had a combined use as both theatre and amphitheatre, particularly in western Europe.

The best Roman site in Wales is the amphitheater at Caerleon, just north of Newport. As for the amphitheater itself, it is oval in shape, with eight great entrances. The Roman Theatre of Verulamium (St Albans) is unique. Built in about 140AD it is the only example of its kind in Britain, being a theatre with a stage rather than an Amphitheatre. Initially, the arena would have been used for anything from religious processions and dancing, to wrestling, armed combat and wild beast shows.

Chester Amphitheatre (CHE/AMP'04) comprises the largest assemblage of fish remains from table or kitchen waste in Roman Britain. The site was very tightly dated from c. AD 71 to the late 3rd century, and 5 phases spanning 2 areas were examined.
